- 1 1/4" piece of fresh ginger, cut into circles

Cover all ingredients in a sauce pan and cover halfway with water. Simmer gently for four hours until a subtle scent fills the house. You can put the mixture on to reheat every day; just add water!

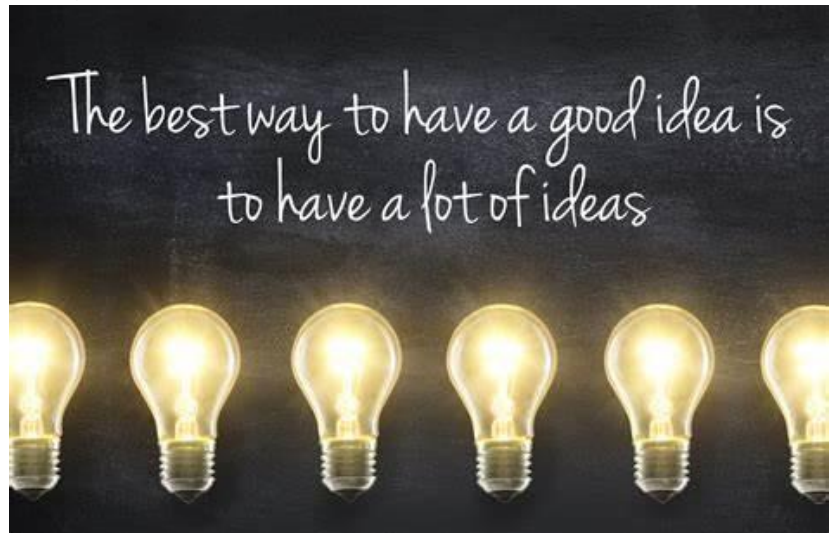
Another idea might be for a few people to plan to create the same quilt from a YouTube video. Posting a before and after picture on our face book or just emails to each other.

The Guild Show Challenge 2021 is underway. A group of Intrepid members has accepted the challenge to create a small quilted piece that interprets the theme "A Moment in Time". They must incorporate a recognizable amount of the challenge fabric (selected by the committee) in the front of the quilt.

The finished quilts will be displayed at our April 2021 meeting for members to vote for "Viewer's Choice". We anticipate that these quilts will be hung in the Tea Room at our 2021 guild show.

Challengers, start your engines!

Editor's note, here is a recap of the rules:

1. The challenge is open to all members of the Trent Valley Quilters' Guild.
2. The theme is "A Moment in Time".
3. A recognizable amount of the challenge fabric is to be used in the FRONT of your quilt.

4. The quilt must be presented, completed, including binding or other completed edging, at the April 2021 meeting of the guild for voting on by the membership as a Viewers' Choice.
5. Size of quilt, outside measurements, to be a minimum of 75 inches and a maximum of 100 inches.

On “**That Weekend in March**” when we started the lockdown I was scrolling through Instagram when I came across a post by **Edyta Sitar of laundrybasketquilts**. She announced that she was going to post a Mystery Quilt over the next 15 days (maybe she thought that would get us through the pandemic!). I decided to participate. With quilt stores closed I planned to use my stash. On Day 1 Edyta posted pictures of the lovely selection of her fabrics that she planned to use in her sample quilt. I didn't have anything quite as nice so I decided that to achieve success I would at least follow her colour



scheme. Fortunately, I had lots of lights and several metres of white.

The first day's assignment was to make four of the 6 1/2-inch double 4-patches which you see in each corner. Edyta also posted a 10 x10 grid and showed where these blocks would be placed in the quilt. Each day the assignment was to make either 4 or 8 of the chosen block. I fell behind on the day we had to make eight little Ohio stars. But I stuck with it. It was fun to discover each day what the new block would be.

After 15 days the complete quilt was posted, along with suggestions for borders. The applique appealed to me. No pattern was provided so I copied it from Edyta's picture. At that point I was going through the garbage for little scraps of pink and blue. It was touch and go. Finally Sewing Essentials opened up and I purchased a bit of blue fabric for binding.

As soon as the 15 days were up Edyta removed the instructions from her website. She now sells the pattern for \$20.00. She calls her quilt “California”. I call mine “In Difficult Times”.

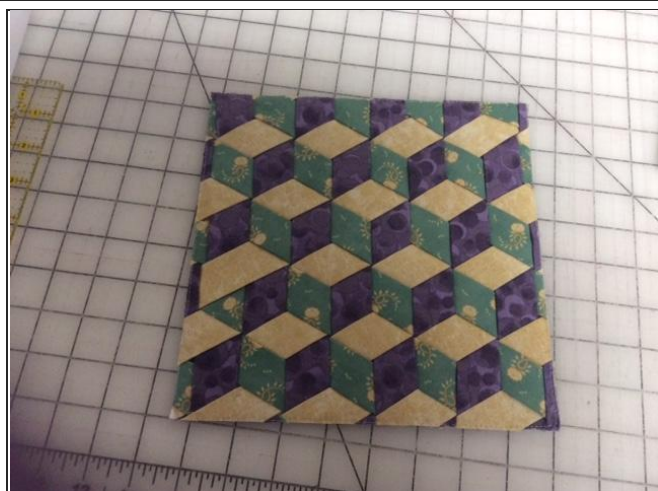


Diane Cichon sent in these photos of her work, and wrote this:

FAT QUARTER PLACEMATS

Fabric Required:

4 Fat Quarters

.75 m backing

.75 m batting

Use $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam allowances throughout.

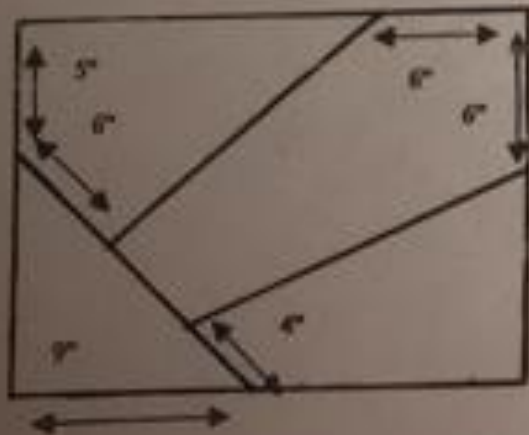
Layer and cut fat quarters right side up to measure 14" x 20". Subcut as in diagram "A" below while still layered.

Shuffle pieces and sew to make 4 tops. Trim.

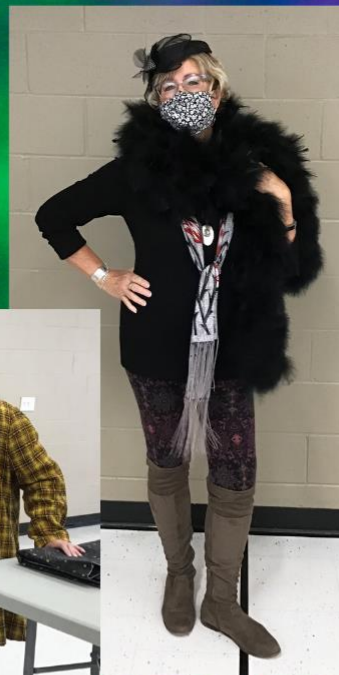
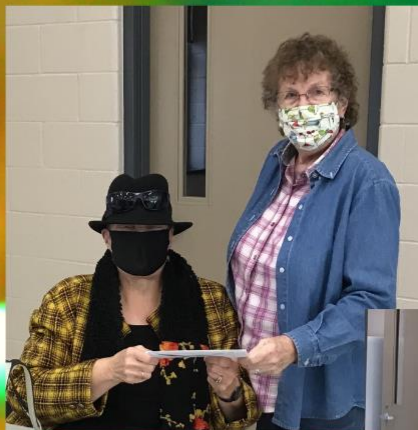
Cut backing to same size as the four tops.

Cut batting to the same size as the four tops.

* Place the top and backing right sides together on top of batting and sew around the edge leaving a small opening to turn right sides out. Trim seam allowances. Topstitch around the edge and "quilt as desired." afterwards or bind
